Alberta Education Assurance Measures - Overall Summary

- a. ECCHS saw a 8.1% increase in Standard of Excellence from 2023 to 2024. In 2024, ECCHS was above the Province in achieving the Acceptable Standard. ECCHS also saw a 17.3 % increase in students achieving the acceptable standard over the previous year's results.
- b. It is recognized that a higher percentage of ECCHS students participate in more diploma exams than the Province. For instance, in 2023, 72.1% of ECCHS students wrote 3 or more diploma exams whereas the Province saw 64.7% of students write 3 or more diploma exams. Additionally, 60.2% of ECCHS students wrote 4 or more diploma exams while the Province saw 52.7% of students write 4 or more diploma exams. This tells us that more ECCHS students are writing Math/Science exams than the rest of the province (due to English and Social being required courses) and perhaps speaks to the program and scheduling choices offered to students.
- c. In 2023, a higher percentage of ECCHS students wrote -1 Diploma Exams when compared to the Province. This perhaps speaks to choices in scheduling provided to our students as well as a focus on maximizing learning opportunities. ECCHS students appear to be committed to challenging themselves as learners by taking more -1 courses.
- d. ECCHS has strong graduation rates, Rutherford Scholarship eligibility, and the school community is highly satisfied with the program of studies that are being offered. This speaks to the strength and flexibility in the programs offered to support student success and the quality of teaching at ECCHS. Areas to focus on include parental involvement, lifelong learning, and student learner engagement.
- e. The school community is satisfied with the support for at-risk students, access to supports and services, and access to programs. These are areas the school will continue to focus on to maintain its high quality of support and ensure fair and equitable access to programs. We will focus on how to improve in the areas of citizenship and providing safe and caring learning environments. ECCHS is committed to creating a safe and caring learning space for all, through its numerous curricular and non-curricular activities and initiatives.
